Outputs are the policies and decisions generated by the political system, which in turn influence societal behavior and generate feedback that shapes future inputs and processes (Easton, 1953). Politics also encompasses the study of power dynamics, as articulated by theorists such as Max Weber and Michel Foucault. Weber

defines power as the ability of individuals or groups to achieve their goals despite opposition, emphasizing the role of authority, coercion, and legitimacy in the exercise of power (Weber, 1921). Foucault, on the other hand, conceptualizes power as diffuse and pervasive, embedded in social institutions and discourses that shape knowledge, subjectivity, and social norms (Foucault, 1980). In addition to theoretical perspectives, empirical research in politics examines a wide range of phenomena, including elections, political parties, institutions, and public opinion. For example, studies on electoral behavior investigate the factors influencing voter decisions, such as ideology, identity, and socioeconomic status (Campbell et al., 1960). Research on political parties explores their organization, strategies, and impact on policy outcomes, while institutional analysis examines the functioning and effectiveness of political institutions in governance (Huntington, 1968). ### **Political Institutions**

These institutions include executive bodies, legislatures, judiciaries, and electoral management bodies, as well as informal institutions such as political parties, interest groups, and civil society organizations. The design and functioning of political institutions influence the stability of democratic governance, the protection of individual rights, and the accountability of political leaders (Huntington, 1968).

Political institutions provide the institutional framework within which electoral systems operate, ensuring the integrity, fairness, and transparency of electoral processes. Strong and independent institutions, such as electoral commissions and judiciaries, play a crucial role in safeguarding electoral integrity, resolving disputes, and upholding democratic norms and principles (Norris, 2014). In every political society, there are usually two types of formalized political power. The democratic or “community based” type and the “dictatorial” or “adversarial” type. Under the former, four major types of political institutions are needed: The rule making institution (Legislative), the rule applying institution (Executive) the rule-adjudicating institution (Judiciary) and finally the rule enforcing institution (Law enforcement agencies). Thus, in this type of political society, what the members of the community do to pursue their collective interest is to create four basic types of political institutions. Each institution contains a number of sub-institutions, with rules specifying the process of decision-making. These rules dictate how to appoint members of the decision-making assembly, how voting procedures should be organized, who should be appointed as judges, civil servants, policy-makers, etc.

The other type of formalized political power known as the "dictatorial" or "adversarial" type is one where the specific geographical area (or the workplace, or the natural resources) is historically controlled by a supreme force, by an individual ruler or a united ruling group. They—the clan, the political élite, the ruling class, the managers, the feudal lord or whoever—want to extract resources from the ruled group as efficiently as possible (North and Thomas 1973; Levi 1988; Gambetta 1993). Under this model, ruler, in order to enforce his will with maximum efficiency, also need four basic types of institutions. One is for creating legitimacy from his subordinates; one for implementing the ruler's will; one to take care of disputes among subjects and subordinates; and one to take action against those who contest the power of the ruler. In short, what the ruler needs to do is to create the same four basic types of political institutions as highlighted above.

In essence, under both models of formalized political power, political institutions remain an constant and integral aspect of all political societies. Political institutions are central to democratic governance, shaping the conduct of elections, the representation of citizens, and the accountability of political leaders. Understanding the interplay between electoral systems and political institutions is essential for analyzing the dynamics of democracy, governance, and political stability in diverse political contexts.

### **Nature of Political Parties in Nigeria**

The transition to civilian rule in 1999 heralded a new era for Nigerian political parties, characterized by the proliferation of parties and the dominance of a few major players. The People's Democratic Party (PDP) emerged as the ruling party, maintaining power for over a decade until its defeat in the 2015

elections. The All Progressives Congress (APC) subsequently emerged as the dominant party, signaling a shift in Nigeria's party system dynamics (Osaghae & Suberu, 2005).
